Do you enjoy hands-on work?

An apprenticeship in a trade is an excellent opportunity to carve out a career pathway. The Registered Apprenticeship Program (RAP) allows you to start your apprenticeship in high school. Student can earn up to 1000 hours in their trade and 40 credits.

Check out the *Tradesecrets* site in your *High School Plus* website under *Work Transitions* and *Trades* for a vast number of resources connected to the trades including a chart showing high school requirements.

In the *Tradesecrets* site check for a lists of the trades available in Alberta (*Trades & Occupations* box and then *Trades & Occupations List*).

Students are reminded to check their completed courses, marks, and credits in their Detailed Academic Report inside their Alberta Education myPass account. Progress toward high school completion should also be checked using the Credential Checklist tool in their myPass account.

If you are are in grades 11 or 12 and are not able to access your myPass account, please see the office or your career counselling to get set up. If you are in grade 10 and don't have an account, please know the school will be connecting you to this valuable resource soon!



Students working in a designated Red Seal trade can apply for a **Canada Apprenticeship Loan** for up to \$4000 interest-free for each period of technical training to cover costs such as tuition, living expenses, tools and equipment.

The Canada Apprenticeship Incentive Grant is also available to registered apprentices who need support in getting started in a Red Seal trade. Recipients may qualify

for up to \$1000 per year for a maximum of \$2000. Applicants



may be eligible for the Canada Apprenticeship Incentive Grant for Women, for qualified trades featuring low female participation, for up to \$3000 per year to a maximum of \$6000.

Look for more opportunities in Financial Assistance in the Trades in High School Plus under Work Transitions - Trades.

## Novel Coronavirus (2019-nCoV)

Subject: Overview of Wuhan novel Coronavirus

#### Overview of the novel Coronavirus

As has been reported extensively in the news, Chinese health authorities have identified a novel coronavirus (referred to as 2019-nCoV) as being responsible for a respiratory outbreak, with most cases linked to the city of Wuhan, China. The situation is rapidly evolving so the numbers will change daily. Isolated cases of confirmed 2019-nCoV respiratory illness have been reported in several countries including the United States and Canada.

It is important to remember that there are a number of common respiratory viruses currently circulating in Alberta and globally, such as influenza. The most likely cause of a respiratory infection in either a staff member or a student will be one of these viruses.

## What you should know:

- Health authorities in China and around the world have taken a comprehensive range of containment, prevention and control measures, and are continuing to investigate the suspected source of exposure, while isolating cases and tracking close contacts to prevent spread.
- There have been no reports of any cases involving Canadians overseas.
- AHS is carefully monitoring the situation and will be able to respond effectively should there be
  any cases in Alberta. This would include necessary follow up and notifications to anyone deemed
  to be at risk from contact with a confirmed case.

#### What you should do:

- If you know of individuals with specific concerns related to potential exposures or related symptoms, please advise them to call Health Link - 811 for assessment and health advice.
- Schools should continue to follow current processes for monitoring and reporting of unusual cases
  of illness and clusters of illness using their established Zone Public Health contacts.
- Regular hand washing and respiratory etiquette (covering the mouth and nose when coughing or sneezing) will protect staff and students from spreading respiratory viruses.
